

Teammates Take Opposite Sidelines

Sixth graders Ginger Defino and Mitchell Hart shared in the glory of victory as teammates on the 2014 Mustang Bowl Champion, Patriots. They hoisted the prized Green Apples Cup in triumph and experienced the joy of success together. On October 14, however, they will be on opposite sidelines battling for the same prize.

As determined by members of the Grant D. Morse staff, Defino and Hart had been nominated to act as the coaches for this year's Mustang Bowl (XII). They were selected based upon their respective abilities to lead, to make decisions and respect among their classmates. Ginger Defino will be coaching the Mustangs, who have lost five of the past six Mustang Bowls. Mitchell Hart will be the coach of the defending champions. "It's an honor," he said. "It feels good to be picked by my teachers."

"It's going to be fun," said Defino, "but it's going to be a challenge." She indicated there were a few

changes in the roster to accommodate Mitch's move to the rival team. "It is kind of weird to lose him, but we have gained Marciano Neglia," she added. Ginger quickly named Marciano as her assistant coach. Marciano has played for many years in the Saugerties Youth Football League and will help Ginger with setting up a game plan.

Rounding out the coaching staff for the Mustangs are captains Madilyn Dodig, Isaiah Snyder, Jared McCaig, Heidi Mulford and Caroline Johansen. The process of selecting captains and putting players into positions has not been easy. Ginger has found the position places strains on relationships in school and she does not want to hurt anyone's feelings, but wants to ensure everyone is put in a position which would help the team. "It is stressful," said Ginger. "I have to keep up with all of my team to see if they are in a position that they are best at."

Ginger is relying on Marciano and the captains to help with the management of the team. "I hope my captains will help me with offensive and defensive strategies."

Hart meanwhile will be joining Jack Quinlan, Madilin Green and RJ Paff who have plenty of athletic ability to share. "I think the teams are pretty fair,"

he said. "I think it is going to be a good game."

The captains are also helping Mitchell with the Patriot game plan. "My captains have been looking at the players and they have helped me find positions for them. They have been a big help."

As of now, both coaches are looking for a positive experience for their teams. "I hope my team plays fair and as hard as they can. I hope they all have fun," said Defino.

"I just want everyone to have a good experience," added Hart. "I'd like the fifth graders to have fun and want to do it again next year."

Ginger agreed, "I hope the fifth graders want to play next year and the sixth graders say it was a great ending to their Mustang Bowl experience."

"Winning is not a sometime thing; it's an all the time thing. You don't win once in a while; you don't do things right once in a while; you do them right all the time. Winning is a habit. Unfortunately, so is losing.

"There is no room for second place. There is only one place in my game, and that's first place. I have finished second twice in my time at Green Bay, and I don't ever want to finish second again. There is a second place bowl game, but it is a game for losers played by losers. It is and always has been an American zeal to be first in anything we do, and to win, and to win, and to win.

"Every time a football player goes to play his trade he's got to play from the ground up - from the soles of his feet right up to his head. Every inch of him has to play. Some guys play with their heads. That's O.K. You've got to be smart to be number one in any business. But more importantly, you've got to play with your heart, with every fiber of your body. If you're lucky enough to find a guy with a lot of head and a lot of heart, he's never going to come off the field second.

"Running a football team is no different than running any other kind of organization - an army, a political party or a business. The principles are the same. The object is to win - to beat the other guy. Maybe that sounds hard or cruel. I don't think it is.

"It is a reality of life that men are competitive and the most competitive games draw the most competitive men. That's why they are there - to compete. To know the rules and objectives when they get in the game. The object is to win fairly, squarely, by the rules - but to win.

"And in truth, I've never known a man worth his salt who in the long run, deep down in his heart, didn't appreciate the grind, the discipline. There is something in good men that really yearns for discipline and the harsh reality of head to head combat.

"I don't say these things because I believe in the 'brute' nature of man or that men must be brutalized to be combative. I believe in God, and I believe in human decency. But I firmly believe that any man's finest hour - his greatest fulfillment to all he holds dear - is that moment when he has to work his heart out in a good cause and he's exhausted on the field of battle - victorious."

Hopefully, Joe Gessner will bring luck




to his Mustangs.

Huddled up, the Mustangs made the call on the first play of the game. They called break and approached the line.


"I had to guard a kid who put up a fight, but I got him," reported Weeks, lineman for the Patriots.

The game was like crossing a minefield, there was always something stopping you. Almost every time there was a pass, there was an interception. It was like this for three quarters, until finally, something happened.

"I thought that usually when I go out for a pass I would catch it, so when he threw it to me, I knew I was going to catch it," said Jacob Morgan, Patriots tailback and receiver




In the opening coin toss, Dudzic called for the Patriots side of the coin to be flipped by first time Mustang Bowl Official Joe Doyle. To Doyle's surprise, the Mustangs' side of the coin was revealed allowing Dudzic's best friend, Kellyann Averill, to get the ball first. On the second play of the game Patriot quarterback and Mr. Eymann Offensive MVP, Nick Slate called a "17 sweep" and raced down the sideline for a 60 yard touchdown. James Golgoski converted the extra point on a 2 yard run and the Patriots never trailed in the game.

Dudzic's Mustang Offense was equal to the task on its first drive. Mustang quarterback Billy Voerg mixed his plays very well to march down the field in a very impressive sustained drive. On a second down and goal to go, the Mustang offensive line behind center Katie Hoffstatter and right guard Erica Florence opened up a huge hole for Jared Valk's 2 yard touchdown run on a "22-Dive" play. The Mustangs converted on the extra point and the game was tied. "My offensive line did a really good job to make the hole open," said Jared Valk who had his first Mustang Bowl TD.

Each team had difficulty scoring for the rest of the quarter. In the second quarter, the Patriot defense anchored by nose guard Chris Strand and defensive guard Ava Mateo mixed their blitzes and stunts to shut down the Mustang attack. Strand recorded the first of his record setting two safeties mid way in the second quarter. Strand finished with 2 ½ sacks and 7 1/2 tackles while Mateo kept the pressure on the Mustangs all day and finished with 3 ½ tackles. "My plan was to mix up the line so everyone could have a different person to try to get through. I switched up the positions of players to see what people we could get around," explained Strand, who became the first player to win the Mr. Turner Outstanding

Lineman Award for his play. He said winning the award made him feel like he won a million dollars.

The Mustang defense was continually pressured as Patriots' quarterbacks Slate and Tom Gambino kept putting the ball in the air against the smaller Mustangs defense. Slate completed his first 5 attempts. Mustangs cornerback Julie Meeker was repeatedly tested as she tried to stop Golgoski, who was a favorite receiver of both Slate and Gambino. Meeker responded to the challenge by batting away many passes and quickly making the stop on pass receptions. Meeker finished with 7 ½ tackles and earned the Mr. Eymann Defensive MVP award. She is the first female to win this award. "I feel honored because it is one of the things I always wanted to win," she said.

The Patriots held its 9-7 lead into the fourth quarter. Both defenses created problems for the opposing offenses as Mustang defenders Joey Schwitz, Jared Valk, Danny Heuckeroth, Martin Bethel, Keilly Wickham and Meghan Pellicane combined for 22 tackles. Schwitz and Trevor Smith each picked off a Gambino pass, as well. The Patriot defense was equally tough with Stand, Mateo, Lesley McCarthy, Reaganne Joyce, Danny Lachmann and Lydia Stelmach collecting 23 tackles. Slate and Emily Wager picked off a pass by Ryan Dudzic and Billy Voerg.

With less than five minutes remaining in the game, Strand picked up his second safety and the Patriots extended the lead to 11-7. Fellow defensive guard Winston Gedicks recalled, "I was feeling so happy that he raised the score of the

game and he had made history." Miles O'Brien, Austin McAvoy and Noah Voerg made big plays to drive the Mustangs down field, however, Strand and the Patriots used a late Mustangs penalty to stop the drive and force a punt.

With the Patriots regaining possession, Averill was called to run a "38 sweep" and looked to be trapped deep in the backfield for a loss. However, wide receiver Payton "Grace" Maloney delivered the best block of the game to spring Averill for a 40 yard gain before being force out of bounds around the 5-yard line. Two plays later Slate hit Golgoski in the end zone for a touchdown that put the game out of reach with less than a minute remaining.

"I felt like the happiest boy in the world," said Chris Strand when he got to hoist the Green Apples cup in victory with his Patriot teammates. Winston Gedicks agreed, "It felt good and exciting." Coach Averill was happy for everyone that played, "It felt amazing because I felt my team really worked together and they really enjoyed playing. It was an awesome feeling knowing everyone was doing great."

Averill was concerned about her friend Ryan throughout the game. "I was yelling 'You rock' and stuff because I didn't want him to be upset. I think that he was really okay with it because he was knowing all the time that we were going to still be best friends."

Despite the soggy outlook, the weather held off and the annual fall touch football classic took center stage at Grant D. Morse School and another spectacular Mustang Bowl took place. Over 1350 fans showed up to see the Mustangs and Patriots battle for supremacy.

As the temperature rose and the field dried out, the teams took to the Jim "Killer" Davis Dandelion Patch at Grant D. Morse School to settle the series which was tied at 4-4 over the previous eight Mustang Bowls. The game ball was delivered by the youngest fans, Mrs. Rachel Fisher's kindergarten class, and Mr. Richard Greco and Mrs. Elaine Buckton were honored for their work with the youth of the Morse community during the pregame ceremony.

Greco was the honorary captain for the Patriots who were coached by 6th grader Connor Staby. The Mustangs' honorary captain was Mrs. Buckton and the were coached by Jacob Geick.

The Mustangs won the toss and elected to kick off to the Patriots. The Patriots quickly ran off five plays before quarterback Damian Gonzalez found John Hewitt in the end zone for the first score of the game. The 21-yard TD pass was deflected by two Mustang defenders before Hewitt was able to grab it for the score. The Patriots missed the kick conversion and the score was 6-0.

The score remained 6-0 until the fourth quarter as each team found difficulty with the opposing defenses. A total of six turnovers and four punts kept the teams from sustaining scoring drives. John Hewitt's twin brother Riley was not to be outdone as he picked off Gonzalez twice. Mustangs QB Riley Merritt was also intercepted by Dylan Henninger and Tristan Marchand. With the overall Mustang Bowl series tied at four, four minutes remained in the game. With each play the crowd grew more excited often drowning out the broadcast team of Superintendent Seth Turner and Dan Passante, JPI TV sports personality. Both Geick and Staby used timeouts, long counts, blitzes and trick plays to try to gain an advantage, but time ran out and overtime would decide the outcome. No other Mustang Bowl was decided by an overtime and the rules committee quickly developed an overtime procedure which allowed each team an opportunity to score from the two yard line. Each team was given four downs to score and the team that scored on fewest downs would win the game.

Since the Mustangs were the challenger as a result of the Patriots three-game winning streak, they got to show their offensive power first. On their first play, the Mustangs went with the

"18 sweep" and Merritt found the end zone putting the pressure on the Patriots to score on their first play or lose the game. Coach Connor Staby decided to use the

same play but run it to the opposite side. QB Gonzalez took the shotgun snap and got the ball across the goal line for the score setting up a second overtime.

The second overtime rule calls for the ball to be moved an additional two yards away from the goal line. The Mustangs got first shot once again and ended up turning the ball over on the second play, giving the Patriots four plays from the 4 yard line to win the game. The Patriots could not penetrate the Mustangs defense and were unable to convert, thus causing a third overtime.

Honorary captains Greco and Buckton took their respective teams and counseled them on their game plans. Between the crowd, the coaches, cheer team and players, the scene was electric. No previous Mustang Bowl had been decided by an overtime and the overall series was on the line. The Patriots team had ended each of their practices with the chant "Patriots Bowl" in hopes of having the event's name changed if they win this game. The Mustangs, on the other hand, worked to end their three-game losing streak and return the "Green Apples Cup" to their possession.

The Mustangs could not score on their first play as a pass play fell incomplete in the end zone. A return to the most popular play of the playbook found Merritt barely making it to "paydirt" on the second play.

The Patriots had one play to win and two to tie, which would send the game to the fourth OT. A fourth OT would have featured the kickers to break the tie.

Although not invisible, the officials worked a fairly penalty free game up to this point, notwithstanding a Patriots penalty for too many players on the field which ended up with the Mustangs getting a second punt and regaining possession on a subsequent fumble recovery. As the Patriots readied themselves for this all-important first play, Gonzalez took the snap ran to the left side and was clearly touched before the goal line. However, the line judge on the goal line indicated that the tip of the ball broke the plane and signaled touchdown giving the Patriots the one point victory and the overall series advantage.

Multiple Mustangs player and fans were upset that an alleged "false start" was not called prior to the snap. The officiating team did not comment on that play but said this Mustang Bowl like all the others provided high drama and excitement and that all the students involved should be very proud of their efforts.

The Mustang Bowl is an annual fifth and sixth grade activity that involves both grade levels as players, cheer team and staff. The game, however, may have come down to a goal line stand by the Mustangs early in the fourth quarter with the Patriots trailing 14-6. Early in the game Mustangs quarterback and Offensive MVP Randy Dodig, found a favorite target Dan MacIsaac for numerous big gains. MacIsaac's catches were all of the acrobatic variety including his TD catch in the corner of the end zone to strike first blood. Mac Isaac reminded fans of New England Patriot TE Rob Gronkowski, as his incredible hand strength picked balls that would not be caught by most receivers.

The Mustangs scored again in the second quarter on a 17 sweep by Dodig and followed it with a two-point kick by Defensive MVP Annika Fisher.

In the second half the Patriots' offense gathered momentum behind the mixed play calling of Craig Laurey and efficient possessions. On a lengthy drive late in the third quarter Laurey found wing back Vaiden Ferraro three times inside the twenty yard line for an eventual score. For the Mustangs and Patriots on October 15 at the Jim “Killer” Davis Dandelion Patch at Grant D. Morse School, those seconds and inches defined victory and defeat.

Trailing 25-24 with 5:30 remaining in the game, coach and QB Jaden Incalcaterra carefully orchestrated a ball-control drive setting up a final play needing only two yards to victory with 8 seconds remaining in the game.

“I tried not to focus on the crowd and play the game,” said the Mustangs’ coach as the crowd’s enthusiasm created an atmosphere reserved for the Super Bowl.

The Patriots took the lead on a fourth and goal from the 25 yard line midway through the fourth quarter. Patriots’ coach Alex Mooers called timeout to decide how to approach the crucial play. Mooers and his Patriots trailed by five points and knew the Mustangs had scored on all but two possessions as Incalcaterra had complete control of his offense highlighted by his Mustang Bowl record of 259 yards on 7 carries and record tying 3 touchdowns. Mooers knew they needed points and may not see the ball again. Mooers gathered the assistance of Jim Gage, who was an honorary captain stand-in for Gladys Hutton, and former Patriot Ty Gallagher in the decision making. They decided the Blue 4 X fade pass play was the best option in hopes of moving the defense away from the 4 back (Alex).

Not until the game was over did Alex realize this was a fourth down, as he erroneously assumed it was third down, making the play even more remarkable. “I knew we were going for it no matter what. It didn’t matter what down it was. We were going for 6,” he explained.

Patriots’ QB Tristan Mawyin (4-6, 2 TDs), broke the huddle called the snap on a two count and the X and Y receivers took the corners and safety to the left side while Alex took a play action fake and sprinted for the right corner of the endzone. Mawyin shook off heavy pressure from the Mustangs pass rush and tossed a perfect spiral to Mooers, all alone in the end zone.

The Patriots did not convert on the extra point but took the lead 25-24 with about five and a half minutes remaining.

The game opened up with a flurry of scoring on the first three possessions as Tristan Mawyin scored on a 65 yd TD run on a 17 sweep. Mawyin then converted on the point after touchdown by running the ball off left tackle. It was the only PAT to be converted and would signify the difference in the final score. Jaden Incalcaterra outdid Mawyin on the Mustangs’ second play, taking a broken play and turning it into a 70 yd TD run down the right sideline. Fifth grader Ginger Defino broke into the Mustang Bowl history books with a couple of big gains including a 7 yd TD run for the Patriots on a 37 sweep. The first quarter ended with the Patriots leading 13-6.

Scoring twice to the Patriots one in the second quarter, the

Mustangs were highlighted by an 80 yd TD run by Incalcaterra,

and a 4 yd TD pass to receiver Dan MacIsaac. Between the two Mustang scores was a 63 yd pass from Mawyin to Oliver Menon who outran the Mustangs’ secondary to “paydirt.” “I ran as fast as I could. It felt really good,” said Menon who scored his first MB touchdown.

At the half, the Patriots held on to a slim 19-18 lead.

The Mustangs had the only score of the third quarter on another broken play where by Incalcaterra was able to scamper 75 yards untouched along the players’ sideline for his third TD, tying him with Tavin Rell (MB VIII) for most TDs in a MB game.

After Mawyin hit Mooers in the end zone for the go ahead score in the fourth, the pressure mounted for both teams. “All I kept saying to the team was ‘Make stops, make stops, make stops,’” said Alex.

Incalcaterra used the short pass and outside runs to keep control of the ball by racking up first downs. Clinton Stutzman, Christie Collins and Dan MacIsaac were sure handed Mustangs’ receivers that kept Mooers and his defense off balance. “Runs up the middle did nothing. Our objective was to get first downs and work the ball,” said Incalcaterra. It seemed that the only that could stop the Mustangs was the clock as they controlled their possession. Though the gains were minimal, they kept the chains moving.

“I was very nervous,” said Collins. “At one point I was shaking because I was so nervous. It was the most exciting game I ever saw,” she added. The crowd was equally excited as the roar could be heard from “Quarryville to Toodlum.” “I didn’t notice the crowd because I was so into the game,” she explained.

The Mustangs called a timeout before their last two plays of the game. The second to last play was a QB keeper on the left side where Patriots’ John Turk made the game-saving stop at the two yard line. Following the next timeout, the Mustangs broke the huddle knowing it was their last play. “I switched myself to corner-back figuring he (Incalcaterra) would run it again. I knew he was watching me so I decoyed him then cheated to the side he would run,” said Mooers.

Mooers had noticed a Mustangs tendency to alternate play directions and he gambled that the play would come back to the right.

Incalcaterra took the snap and immediately raced to the right corner of the goal line. He leaped with the ball outstretched to cross the line, but Mooers stopped him six inches short of victory as time expired.

Incalcaterra, whose game will go down as the best offensive performance in MB history, was disappointed by the loss. Four of his seven carries came off of broken plays and netted him 3 TDs and earned him the Mr. Eymann Offensive MVP of MB XI. “It all goes to the team,” he said. “Without the blocks I couldn’t have gotten past the line of scrimmage. I couldn’t have done it without everyone’s help on the field.

All in all, it was fun, I’d give it a 10 out of 10,” Jaden reflected.

Though he ran for 259 yards on 7 carries, just six more inches or a few more seconds would have changed everything.

Speed stated he enjoyed playing. Speed said he does not remember what position he played.


Auer's position was right tackle. Auer said if there was only staff and cheer he would pick staff because he likes organizing things.


